



In Gainesville, N. Y., Sept. 16th, 1859, Mrs. Sallie J. Joslyn ged 67 years. The religious history of Mrs. J. is but a repetition of that of many others, who, having outgrown the narrow spirit of limited theories, have come into the full and happy enjoyment of that truth which alone can make the soul free indeed. twenty years or more she was a member of the Baptist church; but by reading her Bible (as she informed the good descons who came to labor with her,) she discovered her error, and at once embraced and openly avowed her belief in Jesus as the Saviour of the world. She was "read out of the church," of course, and thus, with one of old, she could truthfully say, " For therefore we both labor and suffer reproach, because we trust in the living God, who is the Saviour of all men, especially of those that believe."— In this faith she continued ever after, a happy and undoubting believer, being always ready to give to every one that inquired of her, a reason for her hope. She was emphatically a good woman, a true wife, a kind and most affectionate mother, and always a true friend to those who confided in her. She bore her protracted sickness with the most perfect patience, trusting implicitly in the character of her heavenly Father. She died at the residence of her son-in law, surrounded by her husband and children, whose united efforts to smooth her then rugged pathway. caused her frequently to exclaim during her sickness, "O how happy I am in being blest with such good children."
