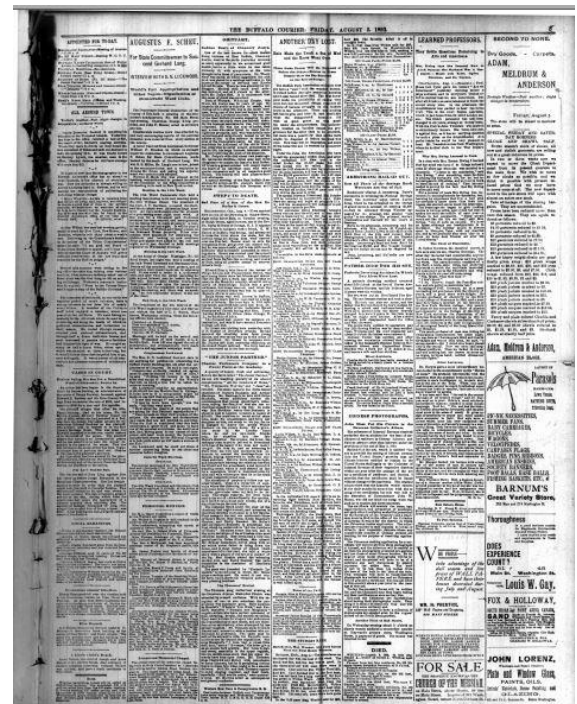
### Sudden Death of Chauncey Joslyn.

One of the best known live-stock dealers doing business at East Buffalo, Chauncey Joslyn, went to the yards yesterday morning as usual, apparently in his accustomed good health; but in a little while he was taken violently ill, with symptoms at the time thought to be those of pneumonia. Dr. Woodbury was called, at whose suggestion the sick man was placed in a carriage and taken to his home at the corner of Seventh and Rhode Island Streets. There he was attended by Dr. Daggett. Medical skill could avail nothing, however, and at 3 o'clock in the afternoon Mr. Joslyn died. It is understood that the cause of death was apoplexy.

Born at Warsaw, Wyoming County, this State, Mr. Joslyn was 54 years of age. He came in his youth to this city to reside, and during all his after life was in the cattle business, being one of the heaviest buyers for the Eastern and Liverpool markets. He was one of the East Buffalo pioneers, engaging in the trade when the yards were just started there. By his business associates he was very highly respected. He was the soul of honor, they say, a man who never failed to meet his obligations promptly, and who was strictly conscientious and scrupulously honest in all the affairs of life. A firm believer in the principles of the Democratic party, he was once a candidate for Alderman of the old 2d Ward, but otherwise he never sought prominence in public life, his large business interests claiming and receiving the most of his attention.

Mr. Joslyn's wife died about two years ago. He leaves six children—three sons and three daughters—to mourn the loss of a kind father. Of friends a great number will deeply regret the death of an excellent man who was a genial companion and in all respects a good citizen. The funeral will take place to-morrow afternoon.

A special meeting of the East Buffalo Association for action on Mr. Joslyn's death will be held at the Exchange this forenoon at 11 o'clock.
