## Stowell-Wiles Art Gallery

*If*ond memories of pleasant boyhood days at West Perry, the fulfillment of a cherished dream, together with the artistry of another native son, are centered in the Stowell Art Gallery and Stowell-Wiles Collection of oil paintings in the Perry Public Library. Opened in 1935, the gallery came by gift from the late Dr. Charles Henry Stowell, physician and educator of Lowell, Massachusetts, as a repository for a collection of paintings by his half-brother's son, Lemuel Maynard Wiles, noted landscape painter and teacher of art.

Today, thirty-one valuable oils by Professor Wiles, one by his son, Irving R. Wiles, the eminent portrait painter, and other mementoes of the family are on display. Five of the paintings were by gift since the original bequest. Visitors will find scenes from this area, from Europe and the Far West, all expertly hung in an appropriate and restful setting. Those whose interest centers locally will enjoy "The Dark Forest," a study near West Perry, a gift from William R. Bathrick; "Scene at Silver Lake," showing a farm house on

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## GAINESVILLE PIONEER CEMETERY

Located on a site donated by William Bristol, pioneer of the Town of Gainesville, this cemetery had doubtless been in regular use since 1820 or earlier, and continued to be the principal place of interment until about 1882. It is situated just east of the old district school and the grounds are maintained by the Town. During 1886 and 1887, considerable agitation developed over the reputed nuisance and health menace of the cemetery and a number of removals were made to the present village cemetery. Today, most of the stones are flat with the turf, show disintegration, in instances only fragments remain, and considerable difficulty was experienced in deciphering inscriptions. More than 200 names follow, taken on the site in May 1950. The grounds are kept mowed and its appearance is a great credit to the Town.
